After-school and out-of-school programs, Preschool programs, Literacy initiatives, Music, Arts, Theater, Outdoor adventures, Parenting education, Mentoring programs, and Substance abuse prevention programs

We believe each child deserves the chance to realize his or her innate potential; to grow up in a nurturing environment with opportunities that feed the body, mind and soul; to have a meaningful connection to the community in which they live; and to be protected from harm. We know that engaged, healthy and educated children grow into self-reliant, contributing adults. Taking care of our children now ensures a stronger future for Vermont.

VCTF funds prevention programs for children and families throughout Vermont. Our focus continues to be supporting the grassroots, direct service organizations who provide primary prevention programs based on community need. From isolated rural communities to small city neighborhoods, VCTF provides seed money in every county of the state to help incubate new programs serving children and families.

Strong, supportive, and dynamic middle level education is imperative for students in some of their most vulnerable educational years. Research shows how Middle Level learners have unique, developmental needs in order to truly thrive. In response to real-time need, Addison Northwest School District has been working towards the expansion of our middle school! Vergennes Union Middle School, will begin as a 7-8th grade middle school in 2023, and move into a 6-8th grade middle school for SY 24. Our vision, built in partnership with educators, families, and students, is clear: a middle school that prioritizes student psychological wellbeing, school culture, and real-world driven learning experiences.

Arts Bus

Ever After Kids - GROWing & GOing

The Arts Bus Ever After Kids Program is GROWing & GOing! What we piloted in 2019 with partner OnePlanet & VCTF's grant has grown to an award-winning, efficient, year-round art enrichment & empowerment program-not just for kids, but for care providers, families, art educators, schools, libraries & communities. The research-supported, needs-based program is based on 2 systemic facts: 1) there will FOREVER be children at-risk in AFTER care programs: and 2) guality art education will ALWAYS be sacrificed from school budgets. It was a steep learning curve to roll out this program just before a pandemic, but that inspired initiatives for art kits & supplies to remote areas in every weather, which together makes magic for heaps of ever after kids!

Arts Bus

Art Van Purchase

Art VanGo: The Arts Bus Ever is seeking Project funding for an all-weather vehicle (cargo van) to continue with the magic we've created in our award-winning, growing & going Ever After Kids Program (and other programs New RouTEEN, Art from the Start). We expect that within 90 days of funding we will begin impacting over 1,200+ kids in Year 1 with weekly art enrichment, likely to double by Year 5 - and this 'project' should keep on rolling for a decade of thousands of children's empowerment thru art!

The research-supported, needs-based Ever After Kids Program is based on 2 systemic facts: 1) there will FOREVER be children at-risk in AFTER care programs; and 2) quality art education will ALWAYS be sacrificed from school budgets. We started with routinized yearround teaching 3-5x/week in afterschool, daycare & summer camp settings, but with the onset of the Covid pandemic, we altered course by starting the Kits4Kids initiative to deliver creative & high-quality guided art enrichment & supplies to remote areas. We are now fully engaged year-round and need a vehicle that can accompany our work to fulfill our mission!

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Vermont

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Vermont

BBBSVT serves children and youth between the ages of 6-18+ in community, and site-based settings. The BBBS 1:1 mentoring service delivery model is an evidence-based preventative practice that fosters social/emotional learning and positive mental health. Youth who are at risk due to factors such as parental incarceration, poverty, homelessness, parent's suffering from an addiction or mental health concern are matched with a reliable mentor "Big". Matches meet for 4-6 hours per month for at least one year. BBBSVT also provides supportive services for volunteers, youth and families including ongoing training, facilitated group activities, monthly support contact, resource referrals, and mental health and prevention education.

Blue Mountain Union School

Blue Mountain Union School

Blue Mountain Union School recently became a full day/full year preschool program and are looking at ways to enhance the materials that are available to our children. With the expansion of our program we are adding an outdoor classroom space for our students to explore within and use their imagination to a whole new world of excitement and learning. With the funds from this grant we are purchasing water exploration tables, mud kitchens, outdoor reading nooks and more. We currently serve 40 children within our preschool program and they come from a variety of backgrounds. Being outdoors is something that many of them are missing or have missed from the pandemic. We plan to expand their learning and their world.

Boys & Girls Club of Brattleboro

Nurture Nature Days - Piloting a Collaboration between BGCB & Vermont Wilderness School

BGCB is piloting our Nurture Nature Days Program in partnership with the Vermont Wilderness School in order to provide structured outdoor learning and recreation environments for youth and their families. This program will operate free bi-weekly on Saturdays from 10AM through noon during the fall of 2023 and spring of 2024. Each session of the program will be operated on a drop-in basis at a different outdoor location around Windham County. This structure creates better access to programming for families in Windham County's rural towns, allowing youth and parents/caregivers to attend the sessions that align best with their schedules. Each program session focuses on different outdoor skills and includes a healthy snack for all participants.

Bristol Hub

More Mountain Bikes for Bristol Recreation Department

The Bristol Recreation Department creates opportunities for families and children to enjoy Bristol, explore new interests, get outdoors and learn new skills. The role as a Recreation Department is to improve the quality of life for community members and make Bristol a better place to live. With this grant BRD is expanding our Mountain bike library, a resource that provides access to free, quality, maintained bikes for the community - both child and adults.

Cabot Community Association

Cabot Community Association

The Cabot Community Association is pairing with the Cabot school, the United Methodist Church, and childcare owner Heather Smires to open the Cabot's Children Center. This will be the only licensed children center within Cabot that serves infants and toddlers, meeting needs of many local families, including the 300 employees of Cabot Creamery. This program will also expand to support preschool children, who will face a need for care when school is closed during the summer. This funding will provide the program with strollers that will allow them to access the Cabot green for quality outdoor time and cribs for a location to rest. Both will also be an intricate part of the licensing plan to provide transportation methods.

Child Care Resource

Specialized Child Care

Specialized Child Care supports children in child care with physical or developmental needs, including children up to age 13 in state custody, and children and families experiencing significant short term stress. Supports include child care financial assistance, transportation coordination and securing placement in an appropriate early care program. In addition, CCR staff provide supports and consultation to early childhood educators to help develop teaching strategies, classroom set-up, program culture, and behavior mitigation to prevent expulsion from care. We embody the data which supports the value of safe, healthy and quality early care in preparing children to thrive in school and life.

Community Sailing Center

Pre-STEM for Preschoolers, Parent/Child

CSC strives to ensure access to Lake Champlain by all community members. Mission-based programs eliminate barriers to access based on gender, ability, income, age, and now, with our latest program, race, culture & ethnicity. Now in our 29th year, we continue to find new ways to provide lake access and life lessons for all. This educational program will be piloted to determine format, design, registration methods, and effective outreach methods. Held on Saturday mornings throughout the summer, this program will engage parents/guardians and their preschool-aged children in Early STEM activities, with funds supporting the design and implementation of the program, keeping it affordable for children from low-income families.

Dad Guild

Dads & Kids

Dad Guild uses a multifaceted approach to engage father figures in their caregiving roles. Since 2019, the organization has developed and implemented over 600 hours of programming to a growing network of nearly 800 fathers across the state of Vermont. The Dads & Kids program is the organization's most popular, attracting over 200 unique participants (including 90 dads) in the 2021-22 fiscal year. In this program, dads and their children meet up at playgrounds, sporting events, restaurants, nature trails, and libraries to connect with one another. Fathers participating in the playgroups strengthen and grow their own peer support network, while children who participate benefit from strengthening their relationships with their own fathers.

Encore After School and Summer Program

North Country Supervisory Union Encore After School and Summer Program

NCSU Encore runs afterschool and summer programs out of nine elementary schools in the NEK. A goal of the program is to keep 6th-8th graders in small rural communities engaged, help them build community, and to leverage their leadership in program, school, community and state decision making. This project would support the establishment and sustainability of a middle school SU-wide GSA (for LGBTQIA+ youth and their allies) that meets for Saturday retreats throughout the year. In these retreats youth will learn advocacy and leadership skills, connect with the local community through service and stewardship, and build community with other youth that they will eventually attend the centralized high school with.

Enosburgh Public Library

Night Out at the Library

The Enosburgh Public Library is the center of the community here in Enosburgh Falls. We are planning a twice a month Night Out event at the library here at the Enosburgh Public Library. One night each month will be for our Teen's only to have a safe space where they can come and enjoy some food, have a space to socialize with friends, participate in the nights events, watch a movie, play games and have a safe spot to hang out. We will also do one night a month for our whole families to have a "Night Out" together, where they will be fed, play games, watch a movie and socialize. We will have a special performer that will differ for each event ex: Trivia Night.

Essex CHIPS, Inc.

Pages, a Book Club for Parents and Caregivers and Friday Nights in the Teen Center

Pages, a Book Club for Parents and Caregivers is a group to gather caregivers to discuss the highs and lows of raising tweens. The discussion will be guided by a book of the group's choosing and will center the expertise of participants. This is an opportunity for parents and caregivers to find community, share tips, and develop a support network. Friday Nights in the Teen Center for High School Students will open our Teen Center space to 9-12th graders. We will offer games, dinner, crafts, and other activities of the kids choosing. Providing this third space for youth at no-cost to families will help engage high schoolers.

Everybody Wins! Vermont

Everybody Wins! Power Lunch

On the 2022 reading NAEP, only 43% of VT 4th-graders scored proficient or above—& only 19% of children in poverty. Reading well and liking to read are tied to further education, well-paying jobs—and a good life as an adult. Everybody Wins! Vermont helps children love to read by matching them one-on-one with volunteer reading mentors who share books & literacy activities and build friendships weekly at school. Children are exposed to new topics & discussions, enhance self-esteem, and show gains in reading skills, self-esteem, and overall classroom performance. Everybody Wins! Connects children with their communities and citizens with their local schools. One principal: "Everybody Wins! Is our most important connection with our community."

Finding Our Stride

Finding Our Stride

Finding Our Stride (FOS) has been addressing the mental and physical health of VT and NH youth for 12 years, reaching over 3,000 kids, grades K-8, with free and accessible after school running programs. In 2021, through careful evaluation, FOS confirmed its meaningful impact on the fitness and social emotional growth of participants (more data below). In 2022, through a board-led strategic plan, FOS committed to growing its regional impact. In spring of 2023, due to a high level of interest, FOS will expand from 10 to 15 VT sites. FOS is in conversation with ten additional VT sites for 2024 and 2025.

Food for Thought

Food for Thought

Food for Thought began in 2008 with the goal of providing supplemental lunch and summer reading materials for children in Grand Isle County at risk for hunger. Our mission is simple. We provide fresh, nutritious (often local), food to the most vulnerable families in our communities when school lunch is unavailable. Families from Grand Isle County sign up through the Congregational Church of South Hero (CCSH). No financial disclosure is required. Once a week, a group of community volunteers puts together boxes which families retrieve either at the CCSH or at a collection site in Alburgh. This program has been run through donation for 15 years, and we plan to serve more families and to continue to source more food locally.

Franklin Grand Isle Bookmobile

Youth Services Proram

Franklin Grand Isle (FGI) Bookmobile is a mobile library and literacy organization that serves the northwestern corner of Vermont in Franklin and Grand Isle Counties. With a primary focus on promoting access to literature and information to help close the education gap between social classes by ensuring Kindergarten readiness, instilling a lifelong love of learning and reading, and supporting vulnerable Vermonters through in-person visits and connecting them with the community. Our unique structure allows us to commute directly to community members, overcoming some obstacles faced by low income Vermonters living in rural communities.

Good Beginnings of Central Vermont

Expanding Access to Babywearing

Babywearing enables caregivers to bond with their newborns, manage stress, and care for their baby and themselves. Families worldwide have carried their babies for centuries. But for many families today, babywearing can be expensive - and overwhelming. Carrier options are confusing and complicated; a good quality carrier may cost over a hundred dollars. Many new parents give up after one failed attempt because they lack sustained support and the ability to try different carriers until they find a good fit for their needs. This program breaks down barriers to babywearing via individualized fitting assistance, practical information on how to carry your baby, and access to a variety of carrier types in a supportive, judgment-free environment.

Green Mountain Mobile Therapy Inc.

Green Mountain Mobile Therapy-Mobile Mental Health

Green Mountain Mobile Therapy is purchasing an electric generator battery, which will increase the mobile healthcare units electric watt capacity. This is a sustainable renewable energy source that is efficient and reduces overall costs for the organization. Green Mountain Mobile Therapy is a nonprofit organization that provides therapy and social/emotional services to Vermont's youth and families in locations that do not have appropriate therapeutic spaces and accessible services. Green Mountain Mobile Therapy engages with schools and community organizations to provide direct mental health services and social/emotional resources.

Green Mountain Mobile Therapy Inc.

Ramp for Accessible Access to Mobile Therapy Space

Green Mountain Mobile Therapy is requesting an equipment grant to fund a ramp installation to our mobile therapy office. This will provide a safer, more accessible entrance to the therapeutic space for children with mobility challenges.

Henry Sheldon Museum of Vermont History

The Henry Sheldon Museum in Middlebury, Vermont is planning a new hands-on space for children and families titled "Inventing the Future: A Kids' Makerspace" and we are requesting funding for a Rig-a-ma-jig Basic Building kit. This space will serve children and families/caregivers from all over Addison County to boost connection, foster engagement, and connect children and families with their community museum. We will invite children and their families/ caregivers to create, collaborate, explore, test, experiment, and invent in the new space and the Rig-a-ma-Jig kit will be an ideal opportunity for children to learn through openended play sparked by STEM/STEAM learning.

Highgate Library and Community Center

Music Garden at HLCC

Highgate Library and Community Center is creating a music garden for all ages to take part in and enjoy in the library backyard. This music garden will contain outdoor musical instrument equipment stations to encourage musical creativity and rhythm and sound education for children and families within the community of Highgate. It will develop and foster a love of music from a young age and will provide social connections for community members.

Janet S. Munt Family Room

Family Play at The Family Room and Gardens

Family Play is a year-round weekly drop-in parent-child interactive play and literacy group for parents and caregivers with children ages 0-5 to offer parent education and support featuring a variety of groups and classes to promote cross-cultural relationships and family health and wellbeing. The program happens on-site from October-May and at a summer nature garden from June-September. Family Play takes place in a community environment featuring supportive experiences, positive expectations, and self-care to effect intergenerational change. With every adult caregiver who participates, there is at least one child who is also benefiting from these nurturing and supportive experiences.

Kids in the Country

Kids in the Country Child Care and Preschool, Inc.

Kids in the Country is a small non-profit child care that serves families in the many surrounding towns in Sothern Vermont. We provide quality care for children ages 6 weeks to 12 years old. We are purchasing learning materials, so that we are able to rotate often and keep the children engage in learning and exploring their environment. We will also purchase organizational materials to get our current learning material closet organized and easy to use so that teachers are able to rotate learning materials often to support the children's development and provide them with the ability to build a strong foundation that they will build on for the rest of their life.

King Street Center

King Street Center Family Support Specialist

For the last six months, King Street Center has been engaged in a strategic planning process with a heavy focus on equity to better approach our work in an anti-racist and anti-bias way. We have met with and listened to our families, alumni, staff, board, volunteers, and partnering organizations to learn about experiences, where opportunities to grow exist, what needs aren't being met, and what KSC means to this community. Among many ideas, one of the most pressing needs we have heard is that parents needs more support, assistance, and connection. To that end we plan to hire a Family Support Specialist to coordinate services, support, and training to assist families in meeting the needs of their children and prevent crisis situations.

Providing Vital Third Space Summer Learning for Low Income Youth

Paran Recreations INC is dedicated to enhancing the health and well-being of rural children from low income families. Our goal is to sustain the access of year-round outdoor and place-based education for our surrounding community focusing on youth populations by providing at least 45% of campers with a full funded scholarship to attend our camps throughout the year.

Lamoille Restorative Center

Lamoille Restorative Center - All Programs

Lamoille Restorative Center is a 43 year old nonprofit that touches the lives of about 1,000 people each year; many of these individuals are children and youth. LRC works in three primary arenas: supporting school success, empowering employment-related goals, and intervening when youth and adults are involved in the legal system. LRC has significant needs related to technology to better meet the needs of lower income program participants who struggle with transportation and other barriers to in-person participation. COVID highlighted the disparities Lamoille's more remote and isolated residents experience regarding access to needed services. LRC can effectively complement in-person services with technology to support participants' goals.

Lawrence Memorial Library

Lawrence Memorial Library Children's Theatre

Lawrence Memorial Library Children's Theater is an 8-week immersive theater program run 4X per year and committed to fostering the growth of young people through the practice of theater arts in a welcoming, youth-centered community library. We are committed to the development of creativity, self-discovery, self-esteem and peer support through theater. Over the course of an 8-week program, the theater group will produce a theatrical performance for the community, demonstrating the value of arts education and community art projects to the participating children, families and audiences. Our first group will begin in July 2023 and the program will run until July 2024

Little School

Little School, Inc

The Little School suffered severe damage from flooding this past summer and we are looking to replace items lost in the flood. We are hoping to purchase 2 new tricycles, and an outdoor magnetic wall. This equipment will help with children's growth across all domains of learning while enjoying our outside play space.

Living Tree Alliance

Living Tree Alliance Adventure Playground and Community Farm

Living Tree Alliance believes all children should explore and connect to the seasons and to each other. Our educators provide outdoor, place-based education for exploring and building community. We host field trips, after school programs, community wide programs, and camps to create experiences of wonder. Youth share in the work of homesteading and interact with our animals, garden and forest. Building out our natural playground will enhance opportunities for creative and collaborative play. We are extending our Adventure Garden by adding swings, a sandbox, sense gardens, and outdoor games for kids ages 6-12 to expand their connection to the land.

The Milton Elementary School located in Chittenden County is one of the largest elementary schools in the state; it has 650 students in pre-kindergarten to 4th grade. Coming off the heels of the pandemic, MES has seen a large increase in behavioral issues affecting students' academic and social experiences. In an effort to help our students in need of social-emotional skill development and their families, MES seeks to create specialized Social Emotional Learning (SEL) support services. The Monarch Classroom will provide guided mindfulness and sensory activities for students to learn and practice regulation, optimistic thinking, self-awareness & personal responsibility, and provide resources to continue this practice at home.

MoonRise Therapeutics

Moonrise Therapeutics Family Support Services and Family Intervention Services

MoonRise Therapeutics (MRT) is a farm-based nonprofit healing psychological trauma and promoting mental health and well-being. MRT offers prevention and psychotherapy intervention, integrating horses, art and movement, to create a uniquely effective setting for healing and growth. Success will be leveraged by using MRT's Family Support Services, utilizing the CIrcle of Security attachment based model, as a channel to pilot more intensive clinical intervention services provided to families in crisis. The goal is to help caregivers/children develop healthy secure attachments, which are the foundation for success in school, social relationships and predictive of a general sense of competence and well-being

NEK Community Growth Center

Family Support Network

We are creating a program to implement targeted Family Support. Our Family Support specialist will have continuous engagement with all our families, support families if they need assistance with child care subsidy applications, help support families facing housing crisis, food insecurities, reach out to local community partners on behalf of the family to ensure they are getting the support needed from each agency they work with or want to be involved with. The Family Support Specialist will schedule and do outreach events with our center and families with the intentional purpose that our families will feel close and connected to our center, their child's teacher and our Family Support Specialist.

Mad River Mentoring

Mad River Mentoring

Mad River Mentoring (MRM) is the only community-based mentoring program serving the four communities in the Mad River Valley. MRM provides 1:1 mentoring for youth aged 8-18 who reside or attend school in the valley. Mad River Mentoring partners with parent/guardians and schools to provide quality 1:1 mentoring opportunities for children and youth who have been identified as at risk or otherwise in need of a mentoring relationship. Our goal is to develop quality adult-to-youth relationships that increase access to the support and resources that youth need to improve their wellbeing, sense of belonging and quality of life. Mad River Mentoring is in its infancy and will be making their first matches in the coming months.

New England Youth Theatre is rebooting our Peer Mentorship Program, which was suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic as programming was scaled down to focus on smaller group sizes. Peer Mentors will focus on developing leadership, communication, team work, and confidence. Each participant will take on responsibilities in support of NEYT programs through a role that aligns with their interests. Throughout the program, a cohort of 12 Peer Mentors will be supported through the process of planning and implementing three events at NEYT with aspects of performance, community engagement, and education.

NFI VT family center

Mwangaza Summer Program

Mwangaza (means Light in Sawhili) Summer Program is designed for and by refugees and immigrants. This program's focus is female high school students who came as refugees from Africa. We want to create a safe and fun space for the students to talk and learn about important and sensitive subjects. Each week is a different topic on social emotional wellbeing, physical health, and personal growth. Experts will be invited to share with the group. For example, a licensed mental health provider for depression and anxiety, a primary care provider for adolescence health and hygiene. At the end of the program each participant will take home a back to school bag that has supplies to enhance their growth.

Northeast Kingdom Human Services, Inc.

SMART Room

Northeast Kingdom Human Services, Inc. Children, Youth, and Families Services needs specialized sensory equipment to work with children who require additional supports for sensory regulation. The equipment purchased for a newly designed SMART (Sensory Motor Arousal Regulation Treatment) room will enhance mental health interventions for an anticipated 10 to 15 children and adolescents each week. The beneficiaries are youth who may have experienced complex trauma, may have an autism diagnosis, and need help with emotional, behavioral, and interpersonal regulation skills. The utilization of this equipment will enhance their social and emotional development and build resiliency and social connection.

Northeast Kingdom Youth Services

Unique to YOUth

Northeast Kingdom Youth Services will create a model that incorporates age appropriate alternative approaches to help young people manage emotional challenges and use the tools developed to minimize their substance misuse and dependency.

ONE Arts

ONE Arts Inc

We know that arts education increases the cognitive function of children, and we know highquality childcare is the difference between a family struggling or thriving. When ONE Arts began, we wanted to offer quality childcare at an affordable rate with an art-centered curriculum. Over the past few decades, political attacks on the arts have caused many communities to lose arts funding. ONE Arts is proud to offer two preschools and an afterschool art center to our community. Over a third of our students are from marginalized groups including include low income families, houseless families, and children of parents who are in recovery. Our schools allow these students and their families to stabilize, grow, and belong in their school home.

ONE Arts Community School

ONE Arts is on a mission to facilitate and coordinate unique and significant art experiences in our local community (Chittenden County) and to build a larger creative community of all ages. Our art center provides daily after school programs and creative camps for elementary ages and middle school in the Old North End of Burlington, while our two early learning locations serve ages 0-5 and their families. We need a new gate to keep the toddlers from leaving the classroom, specifically in our gross motor space. We used a baby gate system, but unfortunately the gate broke, pulling out of the wall. We currently have a couch blocking the exit but this is not a sustainable long-term solution. We are looking forward to replacing the broken gate with a higher quality, safer gate and having it installed by our handyperson. With the \$2,000 from the Vermont Children's Trust Foundation, we will be able to install a high quality safety gate, long enough and strong enough to create a barrier to the exit door and specifically made for children that is ADA compliant. Installing a new gate will help us control exits more safely and securely.

Orleans Central Early Childhood Program

Orleans Central Early Childhood Program

Our early childhood program serves 60 children from seven towns in the Northeast Kingdom. We strive to get our students outside everyday, and some of our playground equipment has been here as long as the program has - almost 20 years! Our custodian, who is a certified playground inspector, is removing two of our play structures, as they have reached the end of their lifespan. This grant will benefit our students by providing safe gross motor activities during outdoor play time. Additionally, our playground is often used by families during our family events, providing developmentally-appropriate equipment options for our youngest learners and their siblings.

Outright Vermont

Expanding and Innovating Programs for Families of LGBTQ+ Youth

Outright is building a VT where all LGBTQ+ youth have hope, equity, and power. A crucial step is ensuring that they have supportive adults in their lives - starting at home. According to The Trevor Project's National Survey on LGBTQ Youth Mental Health, "LGBTQ youth who report having at least one accepting adult were 40% less likely to report a suicide attempt in the past year." The goal for our family programs (TransParent, Panorama, Gender Creative Kids) is to equip parents and caregivers to be that accepting and supportive adult. This year, we will add a new member to our Family Programs team, allowing us to increase participation, expand offerings, reach new regions, and apply new innovative approaches to our work alongside families.

Outright Vermont

Camp Outright

Outright Vermont is purchasing 146-acre Boy Scout camp in rural southern Vermont. This purchase would not only revolutionize our summer camp programs, but ultimately create a year-round home for residential programs. From family retreats to educator conferences, Outright can reimagine what it means to build a Vermont where LGBTQ+ youth have hope, equity, and power.

Partners In Adventure is a year-round, one-of-a-kind non-profit program which offers a wide variety of adapted & inclusive recreational and social programs for young people with disabilities &friends. Our mission is to honor diversity while providing unique experiences that foster independence, self-esteem, & build social & community connections. We have implemented a highly successful music therapy program through grant monies received from VCF last year. We have been able to offer this at no cost to participants & with the amazing work of a trained music therapist we have approximately 20 people every session. Music is highly motivating tool for increased communication skills, social skills, creativity, and self expression.

Prevent Child Abuse Vermont

Project SELFIE (Safe Expression onLine For Internet Empowerment)

Unfortunately, in 2019, 27 % of Vermont high schoolers admitted to either receiving or sending a sext in the past 30 days (YRBS). This can cause youth legal involvement and emotional and social distress. PCAVT's Project SELFIE (Safe Expression onLine for Internet Empowerment) will decrease the numbers of youth who engage in and are harmed by sexting. The program is a developmentally appropriate, trauma informed, sexting prevention program to increase digital safety for youth. It includes presentations for middle and high school students and training for adults on decreasing the digital risks: sexting, online grooming, inappropriate digital communications by adults to youth, and online pornography. Evaluations show the program works!

Reinbow Riding LTD

Strengthening Families through Horses

This is a pilot program developed by Reinbow Riding Center (RRC) in collaboration with Rutland Mental Health's Early Childhood division. RRC is a PATH (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship) member center with PATH certified instructors. PATH is an international organization that teaches and certifies instructors to administer programs. The goal of this program is to provide prevention techniques to families via a therapeutic equine experience to those who have experienced significant traumatic stress. By focusing on the caregiver/child relationship our goal is to provide tools by which a healthy and mutually satisfying relationship can develop and be maintained. Our goal is to support the strengthening families initiative.

Robin's Nest Children's Center

Robin's Nest Children's Center

Robin's Nest Children's Center is a high-quality, non-profit, early education program in the Old North End (ONE) of Burlington. Established in 1985, the Center has demonstrated a commitment to equity and diversity by routinely enrolling families from the refugee and new American population. We plan to improve our program's ability to serve New American families; families who face complex societal and economic challenges with a direct impact on youth. Specifically, we seek to improve social connection, offer interpreters where language barriers exist and support parental resilience. We'd also like to build the cultural competency skills of our staff to promote connection and offer strengths-based guidance.

Full Circle Family Room supervised visitation program

When it comes to helping families in Rutland County, BROC Community Action has been at the forefront for more than 50 years. Under BROC, the Rutland County Community Justice Center provides a variety of services, including victim liaison programs, supervised visits and exchanges, reparative justice panels, Circles of Support and Accountability, and reentry navigation for formerly incarcerated people. Our supervised visitation and exchange program, a haven for families, has been utilized by an average of thirteen families each week since August 2020. The impact is great; however, our visiting room furnishings and toys need to be replaced. Our services are free but wear and tear on our facilities threaten the quality of support we provide. They will be purchasing miscellaneous toys and furnishings, as well as a carpet cleaner and air purifier.

Rutland County Parent Child Center

Rutland County Parent Child Center

The Rutland County Parent Child Center consists of five campuses that provide targeted family support to at-risk community members with each campus addressing specific community needs based on campus capacity and staffing. Our Madison Street, Rutland site currently hosts therapy rooms to provide access for families utilizing specialty providers such as speech pathologists, our family support case management workers, our community resource and workforce navigation program directors, as well as our high-school completion program for pregnant, parenting and at-risk youth. Currently none of these providers or programs have on-site access to a colored printer to support school work, printing marketing, outreach, or data collection materials.

Sage Mountain Botanical Sanctuary

Afterschool in Nature

Afterschool in Nature is an out-of-school program that follows the calendar school year, and provides a platform for youth to cultivate an understanding of themselves and the world around them through the natural lens of a holistic, hands-on afterschool program. The goal of Afterschool in Nature is to develop future leaders to advocate for the protection of their environmental community while providing the resources to nourish the student's whole self. This includes social-emotional wellbeing, and physical and mental health centered curriculum that is evidence-based and realistic to the student's circumstances and background. This program serves students from grades 4th to 8th grade and consists of primarily middle school students.

Saint Albans Museum, Inc.

CREATE at SAM

The Saint Albans Museum (SAM), located in the heart of St. Albans, Vermont, is a non-profit organization that aims to preserve and educate the public about the rich history of St. Albans and the greater Vermont region. In the past couple of years, SAM has made a strong effort to create a more engaging and inclusive environment for all community members, especially young children and families. Vermont Family Network (VFN) empowers and supports all Vermont families of children with special needs. VFN's program Puppets in Education (PiE) uses life-sized puppets to teach children how to keep themselves safe and healthy and to appreciate each other's differences through educational programs for PK–8 students. PiE programs model effective leadership and problem-solving skills and demonstrate respect and inclusion in all communities. For 41 years, PiE has connected with children through powerful puppet programs that address social and emotional issues. PiE reaches 10,000 children annually in VT & NY schools. We promote empathy and kindness while educating students about strategies that break the cycles of abuse and bullying.
